I, Fleet Admiral Mark Williams, am nearing the end of my second term. As such, I will have served the maximum time allowable, per the AFEDS. Therefore, we are beginning the process of electing a new member to serve as our Fleet Commander. As Fleet Commander, I will appoint an Election Officer no later than March 31st of this year.

Nominations for the Fleet Commanders

will be open until July 1st of this year, and the voting results will be tabulated no later than October 31st of this year.

To be deemed eligible to be placed in nomination for the office of Fleet Commander, the nominee must be:

- 1. In the rank of Captain/Colonel or above
- 2. Nominated by a Captain/Colonel or above
- 3. A minimum of 21 years of age
- 4. A member in good standing of SFC
- 5. Have a minimum of seven (7) years of service in SFC
- 6. Have served as a Unit Commanding Officer or in a Fleet Support position for a minimum of one year
- 7. Have completed the Command Basics Exam

Please email nominations to: election@sfcq1.com no later than July 1st. Our Election Officer is Admiral Mary Miller.




USS TRINITY NCC-2018



With a special guest that has not be revealed yet, this year's program promises to be a welcome distraction from the past twelve months of isolation.

55 years is a long time to build a name for yourself, and Star Trek has done just that. From being included on political and governmental policies to worming its' way into everyday lexicon, it is safe to bet that the name Enterprise will live on forever.

But is that enough? When introduced to the world on September 8th, 1966, Star Trek took the world by storm. Nothing could stop its' momentum, not even cancelation. At the time, the technology and ideals were so novel that it inspired a whole new generation dedicated their lives to see them achieved. We have communication devices that were unheard of 40 years ago. Transparent aluminum is now a thing, thanks to a certain time-traveling crew. Even replication technology is being utilized on a daily basis (albeit not as it was depicted on the show, but give it time).

Then along came Star Trek: The Next Generation (TNG). Believe it or not, there was a minority of fans who naysayed the newest offering of Gene Roddenberry, stating "why mess with a good thing?" or "This is a bad idea! It'll ruin Trek as we know it!". AFEDs Article I . 2.A. & B.

2. Honorary Membership.

A. SFC bestows honorary memberships to those it deems worthy. Placement on the honorary roll is decided upon the approval of the Fleet Commander and can only be conferred by an Officer of the Admiralty Board. Members who are placed on the roll must have accepted honorary membership in person or in writing.

B. Honorary members pay no dues, but receive a Commission Certificate and placement on the honorary rolls only. If honorary members decide to receive Fleet benefits other than participation in Fleet activities, they must pay dues



Starfleet Academy is one of your benefits of membership to Starfleet Command. The Academy's job is to develop future Starfleet officers along with providing some wonderful knowledge exams on Star Trek episodes. The Academy will help you in your first step of becoming a Starfleet officer in your specific career path.

First you must go to www.starfleet-command.com and click on Enlist and then on **Starfleet Academy**. If you are a new Recruit and enlisted after February 2021, then you must register with the Academy and become a Cadet. If you enlisted before February 2021 you just need to go to the Academy page and fill out the **Starfleet Academy** Request Form and submit. All new Recruits must wait to request their first exam until after they have become a member for thirty (30) days to request their first exam.


After your request you will receive an email from the M-2000 Academic Database with the link of the exam

requested. You will have Ten (10) to complete and submit your exam. Once you submit your exam the M-2000 Academic Database will automatically grade your exam and you will be able to view whether you passed.

In 5-7 days you will be sent in an email, your Official Notification of your Exam Grade and your Certificate of Achievement. At that time you can request your next exam from our list of

Departmental and STEP (Star Trek Episodal Probes).
