Winter Safety

"Tis the season to focus on winter safety," for our crews, friends and family. Here are a few ideas from the National Safety Council to get you ready.

1. It's a good idea to change the batteries in your smoke and carbon alarms when you change your clocks to and from Daylight Savings Time. The NSC also recommends testing them every month and if your alarm is pushing 10 years it is time to replace it. Check your fire extinguisher to ensure that it has the proper charge and replace it if it is low.
2. If you have a Chimney, clean it to prevent chimney fires.
3. Get your furnace/heating system checked by a professional. If it's under an extended warranty it may require annual checks. Be sure not to store newspapers, rags or other items near it that may ignite. When using space heaters use caution. Don't put them too close (3 feet) to anything and don't leave them unattended.
4. Prepare your vehicle. Ensure you do your regular maintenance but for the winter it's a good idea to add deicer to your wiper fluid to prevent it from freezing. Also check the concentration of anti-freeze in your car and the tread on your tires. In some of our Northern areas, snow tires may be needed.
5. Be ready for the cold and ice. In cars I put a small shovel, a battery jump starter with power adapters and air compressor, melting salt, blanket and a first aid kit. I've started more cars and gotten more cars out of the snow than I've had to of my own. It's also a very good for my peace of mind that my family has emergency tools with them if they or their friends need them.
6. Finally get your flu shot, unless your physician has told you not too. It takes two weeks for the medication from the shot to build up in your system. It will protect you from the most common strains that are out there this season.

Election Season has Begun!

Elections for the Quadrant One Fleet Commander are held every 4 years. The newest election cycle opened at the 2013 Annual Meeting when the current Fleet Commander, FADM Roy Jackson, started the call for nominations. FADM Jackson stated he will not be running for re-election.

FCAPT Gene Adams nominated ADM Mark Williams, Deputy Fleet Commander. ADM Williams accepted. No further nominations were made at the Fleet meeting, but nominations may be made through June 2014. Nominees must meet the following criteria:

- Hold the rank of Captain/Colonel or higher.
- Be at least 21 years of age
- Be a SFC member in good standing
- Have a minimum of 7 years of service in SFC
- Have served as a Unit Commanding Officer or in a Fleet Support position for at least one year.


Nominees must also complete the Command Basics exam. Nominations must come from a member holding the rank of Captain/Colonel or higher. If you wish to make a nomination but do not meet the rank requirements, please contact your Unit CO, Starbase CO, or an Admiralty Board member.

The Admiralty Board members and Starbase Commanders will conduct a closed vote in September 2014. A change-of-command ceremony will be held at the 2014 Annual Meeting to be held at Starbase Indy.



Greetings, Fleet! I am ADM Kevin Johnson, your new Chief of Membership Services. It is my pleasure to create new-member kits, process promotions, help commission new SFC starships and space stations, and overall, improve the member experience.

Our fleet is growing strong! As of 20Nov 2013, Quadrant One (North America) has 405 active members in 4 different countries. We have had 19 members join SFC just since the beginning of September!

We have 116 enlisted personnel, 258 officers, and 31 midshipmen (age 9 and under). Of those 405 members, 158 hold a lifetime membership. See a membership application for lifetime member pricing.

We have 39 local chapters. Most chapters are starships, but we do have space stations, a ship yard, and planetary outposts as well. The average chapter size is 8. The largest chapter is the USS Endeavour at 45 members!

I took the opportunity to show them how to do blankets as we were heading towards a planet that has been devastated by many earthquakes and tsunamis and extreme climate changes, which left over half of the planet's residents without homes and basic necessities. I admit that what we can do is a small drop in the bucket, but every bit helps.

I have not had a chance to make any log entries until now. We have been so busy helping that all I can do is take a nap here and there and eat when I can. When we finally got there, I was so overwhelmed by the devastation that it took my breath away. I didn't know where to start. The people were so lost that I couldn't imagine them ever recovering from this. When we were looking around, my captain saw an elderly lady in the corner just sitting. He grabbed one of the blankets that we had made and wrapped it around her. It was like a light had turned on in her eyes. She gave him the biggest smile and thanked him. So, for the rest of the day we handed out the blankets with food and water. That was the start of a very long two weeks that had become the most rewarding two weeks that I have experienced. At first, I didn't think that it would be possible for them to recover. Now I have no doubt that they will. I saw people risking their own lives to save two little dogs for some children who had been upset about them. I saw another man go into the water and let a dog climb on his back so he could get him to safety. Also, there were many ships coming with food, water and basic needs. Many people came and helped them to build temporary shelters. I know that this will be a shining example of spirit and great compassion.
